VISION: A world where everyone has a decent place to live.

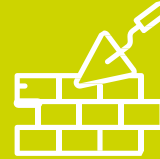
INTENDED IMPACT: Ensuring working class people in NYC and Westchester build equity and achieve housing stability through permanently affordable homeownership.
